ACCEPT THE MINUTES OF THE OCTOBER 18, 2016 REGULAR MEETING.

#### REPORTS/PRESENTATIONS

- Treasurer's 2015 Annual Report Kris Ostermann, Treasurer, gave a brief summary of the 2015 Treasurer's Annual Report. Ostermann stated they received approximately 19 million in taxes with less penalty and interest. Delinquencies were down approximately 3% and foreclosures started with over 100 properties and the County sold 11 properties.
- Planning and Development Department's 2015 Annual Report Karl Jennrich
  gave a brief summary of the 2015 Planning and Development Annual
  Report. Jennrich stated activities started to pick up in 2015.
  Revenues/fees have started to steadily increase. Jennrich would like to
  incorporate a Land, Water and Conservation report along with the
  Planning and Development report for next year.

Chairman Hintz stated health insurance is a big issue for the budget. A request for health insurance quotes came back with the current provider's increase of 15%. The County stated they could only afford a 7% increase and asked what they could come up with; the current provider came back with a 6.5 % increase for 2017. Other bids for insurance were also looked at.

Another big issue was to increase level of service for the Three Lakes and Sugar Camp rescue squads so that they would equal current services with the other municipalities.

## 2017 Budget Summary:

Margie Sorensen, Finance Director, summarized the 2017 Budget by stating:

Budgeted expenditures are \$51,106,037 for 2017.

Budget Revenues are \$30,634,820.

County sales tax is estimated at \$4,250,000.

General Property Tax \$16,221,217, which is a 3% increase in the gross levy by \$464,982.

The ambulance is excluded from the levy limits and 1.88% of the 3% increase is due to the expanded ambulance service.

Equalized value/\$1000 is \$6,724,106.4 which at a rate per 1,000 is \$2.41 this would make a \$100,000 home have a County tax of \$241.

#### **RESOLUTION #68-2016**

Resolution offered by Supervisors of the Conservation & UW Extension Committee Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Oneida County, Wisconsin:

**WHEREAS**, Oneida County has over 1100 lakes, rivers, and streams, and contains one of the highest concentrations of natural lakes in the world, and

**WHEREAS**, Oneida County is 82 percent forest and 2.3 percent agricultural land, and

**WHEREAS**, Oneida County recognizes the importance of the quality of our forests and waters to its citizens and local economies, and

**WHEREAS,** education is one of the keys to increasing public awareness as to the adverse impacts of erosion, nutrient loading, and run-off on the quality of our waters and our local economies; and

**WHEREAS**, Oneida County recognizes the need for a workable plan that will prevent erosion, increase nutrient management, reduce run-off, and increase shoreland protection, and

WHEREAS, the Oneida County Land & Water Conservation Department (LWCD) will implement additional objectives and activities in the Land and Water Resource Management Plan by creating and hiring a 'Lakes Specialist' LTE, and

WHEREAS, 75% percent of the cost of accomplishing additional goals and activities in the Land and Water Resource Management Plan will be paid by a grant from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR), and

**WHEREAS**, LWCD must apply for a grant through the "Lake Classification" grant program through the WDNR to receive funding.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that LWCD is authorized to apply for 75% funding assistance for such programming under the "Lake Classification" grant program from the WDNR.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the Oneida County Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the Chairman of the Conservation and UW Extension Committee, to submit an application for a two-year grant to the WDNR not to exceed \$50,000.00 in grant funds for a Lakes Specialist position, to sign documents and take the necessary action to undertake, direct, and complete the approved lake classification grant, and submit reimbursement claims along with necessary supporting documentation within six months of project date completion.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the LWCD is authorized to meet the County's 25% share of the financial obligations of this lake classification grant, through the assignment of LWCD personnel to work on and complete the project, including timely publication of the results.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that if funding is not secured from the WDNR, the LTE position will not exist.

# RESOLUTION #75-2016 - GENERAL CODE OF ONEIDA COUNTY, WISCONSIN ORDINANCE AMENDMENT #

Ordinance Amendment offered by the Administration Committee

**WHEREAS**, the Oneida County Public Records policy is set forth in the Oneida County Code in section 1.30; and

**WHEREAS**, various Oneida County departments have indicated that they are rapidly running out of space for storage of paper records; and

**WHEREAS**, those same departments have requested the authority to scan and electronically store documents in order to save storage space; and

**WHEREAS,** Wisconsin State Statutes section 59.52(14) allows for the storage of records in an electronic format with County Board authorization; and

**WHEREAS**, a records custodian that elects to store records electronically shall continue to follow all records retention schedules & the requirements of Wis. Stat. s. 59.52(14).

# NOW, THEREFORE, THE ONEIDA COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as required by law.

Section 3. If any claims, provisions or portions of this ordinance are adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Section 4. Section <u>1.30</u> of the General Code of Oneida County, Wisconsin, is amended as follows [additions noted by underline, deletions noted by strikethrough]:

[Ordinance Sections 1.30(1)-(7) shall remain unchanged]

(8) PRESERVATION THROUGH MICROFILM OR OPTICAL DISK/ELECTRONIC STORAGE. The Oneida County Boards authorizes Any County officer or the director of any department or division of County government to may, subject to the approval of the County Board, keep and preserve public records in his their possession by means of microfilm, or other photographic reproduction or optical disc/electronic storage method. Such records shall meet the standards for photographic reproduction set forth in §16.61(7)(a) and (b), Wis. Stats. and/or the standards set forth in 59.52.(14) Wis. Stats. for optical disk/electronic storage and shall be considered original records for all purposes. Such records shall be preserved along with other files of the department or division and shall be open to public inspection and copying according to the provisions of State law.

WHEREAS, the Planning & Development Committee, having considered Petition 5-2016, (copy attached) which was filed October 12, 2016, to amend the Master Zoning District Document and the Oneida County Official Zoning District Boundary Map, and having given notice thereof as provided by law and having held a public hearing thereon November 2, 2016 pursuant to Section 59.69(5), Wisconsin Statutes, and having been informed of the facts pertinent to the changes which are as follows:

To rezone land from District #8-Manufacturing and Industrial to District #7-Business on property described as part of Outlot 7, Village of Hazelhurst, located in SE SW, Section 3, T38N, R6E, PIN HA 606-14, Town of Hazelhurst, Oneida County, Wisconsin.

And being duly advised of the wishes of the people in the area affected as follows:

#### **RESOLUTION #77-2016**

Resolution offered by Supervisor Bob Mott & Supervisor Jack Sorensen.

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Oneida County, Wisconsin:

**WHEREAS,** due to recent changes by the State Legislature by Wisconsin Acts 55, 167 & 391 Oneida County is in the process of repealing and re-creating the Oneida County Shoreland Zoning Ordinance; and

**WHEREAS,** one of the current changes to the Oneida County Shoreland Zoning Ordinance is to allow for boathouses up to 1080-square feet; and

**WHEREAS,** Oneida County has over 1100 lakes, rivers, and streams and contains one of the highest concentrations of natural lakes in the world; and

WHEREAS, Oneida County understands the importance of clear, clean, and

healthy lakes; and

**WHEREAS**, increased runoff from larger structures with more impervious surfaces and the runoff caused by these surfaces leads to reduced water clarity; and

**WHEREAS,** reduced water clarity of just three (3) feet has been shown to reduce waterfront property value of \$20,000 per 100 foot lot; and

**WHEREAS**, 76 percent of Oneida County's assessed value comes from lakefront property and reduced lakefront value would lead to reduced tax collections in towns and the county; and

**WHEREAS**, reduced waterfront habitat caused by larger structures means fewer natural creatures like frogs, loons, and other waterside creatures; and

WHEREAS, hard surfaces reduces the ability of soil to filter runoff of naturally occurring phosphorous in the soil leading to higher algae blooms and reduced water clarity; and

**WHEREAS**, runoff can carry silt that covers spawning areas and leads to reduced fish production; and

**WHEREAS,** when the impervious surface percentage on a shoreline goes past 12 percent, fish numbers in adjoining waters plummet; and

**WHEREAS**, impervious surfaces closer to the water have a greater impact than those farther away; and

**WHEREAS**, the average boathouse size of 28 counties in a recent survey is 349 square feet; and

WHEREAS, the size of the boathouse is one thing left in local control; and WHEREAS, a smaller footprint on the shoreline reduces future conflicts with building setbacks for drainfields, wells, etc. on smaller lots; and

**WHEREAS**, future owners may not like large boathouses blocking their lake view and thus reducing marketability; and

**WHEREAS**, Oneida County should limit the size of boathouses to 480 square feet; and

**WHEREAS**, in proposed changes to the Oneida County Shoreland Zoning Ordinance, Chapter 9, Article 9.94 should be changed to limit the size of a boathouse to 480 square feet: and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Planning & Development Committee shall amend Chapter 9, Article 9.94 of the proposed changes to the Oneida County Shoreland Zoning Ordinance to limit boathouses to 480 square feet; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Planning and Development Committee shall hold the statutorily required public hearing on the aforementioned ordinance amendment with the language limiting boathouses to 480 square feet; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Planning and Development Committee shall bring the Ordinance Amendment to the full County Board after the public hearing

Offered and passage moved by Supervisors: Mott and Sorensen Seconded by: Supervisor Alan VanRaalte.

Motion/Second: Mott/Sorensen to amend line 12, "1080" should read "1008".

Roll Call Vote: 19 Ayes, 0 Nays, 2 Absent – Freudenberg and Cushing.

Student Representative: 1 Nay.

Motion to Amend: passes.

Supervisor Mott stated that he and Supervisor Sorensen would like to amend the size of boathouses to insure more protection for lake quality. Structures next to the lake will cause deprivation of the lakes and smaller boathouses are an opportunity to protect our waters. Currently Shoreland Zoning Ordinance allows for boathouses up to 1008 square feet. Approximately 28 counties that were surveyed their average boathouse size is 349 square feet.

Per Brian Desmond, Corporation Counsel, any changes to the standing Resolution would have to go out to a public hearing again. Supervisor Holewinski stated there has been at least 3 public hearing on this subject. It seems like we keep coming back on this issue. The County would need to specify depth and height; we cannot just say 480 square feet and leave it at that, as it can be interpreted many different ways.

<u>Public Comment:</u> Kathy Noel, Sugar Camp, stated it is up to the citizens to do the right thing. This Resolution is an economic issue and she feels a boathouse is a boathouse only. She approves of the resolution with 480 sq. ft.

Karl Jennrich, Planning and Zoning Director, stated a definition of a boathouse is it stores boats and boating material and related items. A flat roof boathouse still can be used as a deck.

Supervisor Sorensen would like this resolution sent back to Planning and Development for a public hearing. Per Chairman Hintz and Brian Desmond, Corporation Counsel, this is what this Resolution states, it would require a public hearing on the aforementioned ordinance and the ordinance amendment will come back to the County board after the public hearing with a recommendation on the change. Supervisor Mott stated he is okay with a reasonable alternative to the change of 480 square feet to more of a precise size. It was suggested to replace the number "480 square feet" with "a reduced size" and send it to public hearing.

Brian Desmond stated you have to have a number in the resolution for a size to go back to public hearing for people to comment on, you cannot just state "reduce the size". Chairman Hintz stated the resolution is written for change but any change would have to have a new public hearing.

More discussion took place on boathouses, runoff and water clarity.

Alex Bess, Student Representative, excused at 11:45 am.
