Re: Veterans Service Office 2022 Annual Report

Attached is the 2022 Annual Report for the Oneida County Veterans Service Office. Some of the highlights are:

- We averaged more than 21 veteran contacts each working day between our daily phone calls, appointments, walk-ins, home visits, and electronic communication (Facebook, email, and texts).
- Oneida County veterans received almost \$40 million in benefits, which is reflected on page 1 (does not count the cost of treatment at VA facilities).
- We gave out \$4,323.15 in grants for veterans in need.
- The total cost to operate the Veterans Service Office was \$161,669; however, we received an \$11,000 grant from the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs which was used toward my salary.





#### "FEEL GOOD" STORIES

Helping others and making a difference in their lives is what we are about. This is not a job to us, it's a passion. We have our losses some days but most days are victories. Below are just three stories that happened to our veterans in 2022 that made us extra proud of the work we do.

- 1. We had a military retiree move to Oneida County from another county in Wisconsin. She was 30% service-disabled and had been since 2018. Military retirees cannot draw their full military retirement and their full VA disability concurrently unless they are at least 50% service-disabled. Since she was only 30%, she received her full VA disability but that amount was then reduced from her military retirement pay each month. When she came to our office to meet us and let us know she now lives in our county, we looked at her VA disability and realized the VA made an error in their calculation, and she should have been 50% service-disabled all along. We filed for Clear and Unmistakable Error (CUE) and the VA agreed they made an error. Not only was her monthly VA disability increased by about \$900 per month but she also received a retro payment of over \$26,000 due to being underpaid for about four years.
- 2. Another veteran who moved to our county from another state was 100% service-disabled but she was unable to get a wheelchair and other equipment she needed for Multiple Sclerosis through her previous VA health care system because she was not service-connected for MS. We asked when she retired from the military and realized she was diagnosed with MS only a few years after her retirement. If a veteran is diagnosed with MS within seven years of retirement or discharge, it's automatically considered a service-connected disability but no one in her previous state had told her that. We filed a disability claim for MS and other secondary conditions it causes. Not only did she get extra pay but now she's able to get all the equipment she needs to stay in her home. She thought she was only months from having to go into a nursing home (and she's only in her early 50s) but because of our assistance, she can live safely at home now.
- 3. We helped a Vietnam veteran who doesn't live in our county but didn't feel like he was being helped like he should be. He felt his disability rating should be higher and he had all but given up working with the VA. We reviewed all his past VA claims, medical records, and military records and saw where mistakes were made. This process took weeks but after everything was reviewed, we filed claims and appeals. When all was said and done, the veterans received \$58,000 in retro pay and now receives over \$2,000 in VA disability pay, and we're still working with him on other claims. Our assistance provided him a much better quality of life, plus he and his wife were able to take their first "real vacation" in over 30 years.

#### ONEIDA COUNTY DAV VAN

The Veterans Service Office coordinates the DAV van which in 2022, served 41 veterans from four different counties. This service is  $\underline{free}$  to Oneida County and  $\underline{free}$  to veterans. If we paid mileage at the VA rate to the Oneida County veterans who used the van, we would be required to pay them \$.415 per mile for an annual total of \$1,769.56. We believe it would be more than that, however. There are many veterans who aren't eligible for travel pay from the VA and if they could get paid mileage from the county, many more veterans would claim mileage. Other counties that have a veteran population around the same size as Oneida County, easily spend \$10,000 or more each year on mileage for their veterans.
